## News

### Adding folic acid to flour

The Department of Health and Social Care has launched a [consultation on adding folic acid to flour](#). The Department is seeking views on a proposal to make it mandatory for flour millers to add folic acid to flour. Raising folate levels in women who could become pregnant would help reduce the number of babies born with neural tube defects. The consultation closes on 9<sup>th</sup> September 2019.

### Avoidable deaths from eating disorders

The Public Administration and Constitutional Affairs Committee has published [Ignoring the alarms follow-up: too many avoidable deaths from eating disorders](#). This inquiry examined NHS care for patients with eating disorders following the publication of the 2017 report on how NHS eating disorder services were failing patients. The inquiry found that since the recommendations were made in December 2017, not enough action has been taken to implement them fully across the NHS risking avoidable deaths.



### Be Part of Research

The National Institute for Health Research has launched a new website [Be Part of Research](#). This developing website has been designed to make it as easy as possible for the public to find out about health research and enable them to take part. It also acts as a tool that clinicians and healthcare professionals can use to support patients who ask about research. The website replaces the UK Clinical Trials Gateway.

### Child obesity plans

The Government has announced £1.5 million in funding for five councils as part of the [Childhood Obesity Trailblazer programme](#). Each of the councils, which include [Nottinghamshire County Council](#), will be awarded £100,000 a year over the next three years, plus support from the Department of Health and Social Care, Public Health England and the Local Government Association. The funding will help the recipients to test and refine their ideas for addressing childhood obesity and health inequalities.

### Health effects of Sure Start

The Institute for Fiscal Studies has published [The health effects of Sure Start](#). This report looks at the overall impacts on health of the Sure Start programme. Findings include that Sure Start significantly reduce hospitalisations among children by the time they finish primary school; it benefits children living in disadvantaged areas most; there is no evidence that it impacted on child obesity at age 5 or maternal mental health; and a simple cost–benefit analysis shows that the benefits from hospitalisations are able to offset approximately 6% of the programme costs.



### Interim NHS People Plan

NHS Improvement has announced the [Interim NHS People Plan](#). This plan sets out a vision of how people working in the NHS will be supported to deliver care and identifies the actions required. Some actions will make a rapid difference in 2019/20, and some will lay the groundwork to grow the NHS workforce, support and develop NHS leaders and make the NHS the best place to work. NHS England has published both a [summary of engagement with stakeholders to date, as well as further information regarding specific groups of NHS staff](#), as well as the [speech from the Secretary of State for Health on the launch of the NHS People Plan](#). The Healthcare Financial Management Association has published [Summary of the Interim NHS People Plan](#). This briefing summarises the key points across the five key areas of the interim plan – making the NHS the best place to work; improving the leadership culture; tackling the nursing challenge; delivering 21st century care; and a new operating model for workforce.

### Public health services

The Department of Health and Social Care has announced that [local authorities will continue to commission public health services](#). The review recommends that the NHS work much more closely with local authorities on public health so that commissioning is more joined-up and prevention is embedded into a wider range of health services.

## Public Health

### General:

#### **Autism self-assessment framework**

Public Health England has published the results from the [2016 and 2018 Autism self-assessment framework \(SAF\) exercise](#). These reports present the findings from the fourth and fifth autism self-assessment exercises carried out by local authorities in 2016 and 2018. It shows the local authorities' progress towards meeting the requirements of the Autism Act.

#### **Health risks associated with tattoos and piercings**

The Royal Society for Public Health has published [Skins and needles](#). This report examines the health risks associated with the increasing number of people in the UK having tattoos, piercings and other treatments that compromise the skin barrier. It also highlights the need for additional procedures, such as dermal fillers, to be added into legislation.

#### **Population health framework for healthcare providers**

NHS Providers has published [Population health framework for healthcare providers](#). This framework sets out principles for a population health approach that can be taken by provider organisations, working as part of an integrated health and care system.

#### **Public health and prevention**

IPPR has published [Ending the blame game: the case for a new approach to public health and prevention](#). This report advocates that action on prevention will not only improve health but also lead to increases in economic growth, make the NHS more sustainable and help to deliver social justice. It calls for the government's prevention green paper to deliver a paradigm shift in policy from interventions that 'blame and punish' to those that 'empathise and assist'.

#### **Public health risk awareness self-assessment tool**

The Association of Directors of Public Health and the LGA have developed the [Public health risk awareness self-assessment tool](#) to support system leaders in local authorities in defining and understanding risk as it relates to public health commissioning, performance, partnership and resource management.

#### **Public value**

Nesta has published [Public value: how can it be measured, managed and grown](#). This paper brings together views on better ways of mapping and measuring public value. It builds on work Nesta has done in many fields - from health and culture to public services - to find more rounded and realistic ways of capturing the many dimensions of value created by public action.

#### **Sexual health services**

The Health and Social Care Committee has published [Sexual health](#). This report calls for sexual health to be sufficiently funded on a national level, to deliver high quality sexual health services and information. It recommends that Public Health England should develop a new sexual health strategy to provide clear national leadership in this area. It also sets out the key areas this strategy should focus on.

## **Cancer:**

### **Cancer patient survival: stage at diagnosis**

The Office for National Statistics has published [How stage at diagnosis affects survival of cancer patients](#). This article presents new five-year cancer survival estimates by stage and outlines how stage of diagnosis for different cancers affects health outcomes.

### **Children and young people's cancer services**

NHS England has launched two consultations seeking views on proposed changes to [Children's cancer services](#) and [Teenager and Young Adults Cancer Services](#). The aim of the revised service specifications is to improve the outcomes and experience of children, teenagers and young adults with cancer. The consultations close on 4<sup>th</sup> August 2019.

### **Data-driven approach to cancer care**

Reform has published [Reformer Thoughts – a data-driven approach to cancer care](#). This article summarises views of healthcare experts and shows how data are currently shaping the delivery of cancer care, how to gain the most from data that are currently available and how to maximise the potential of this data in the future.

### **Oesophago-gastric cancer**

The Healthcare Quality Improvement Partnership has published [Oesophago-gastric cancer: short report](#). This is part of a series of short reports exploring specific issues in Oesophago-Gastric (OG) cancer. This report examines why patients with a curative treatment plan for oesophago-gastric cancer do not go on to receive surgery. The National Oesophago-Gastric Cancer Audit plans to follow-up this initial investigation with further evaluation to enable specific recommendations in subsequent works.

### **Societal impact of treatment of early breast cancer**

RAND Europe has the findings from a study on the societal impact of early breast cancer. The findings are published in the following reports:

- [Understanding the societal impact of treatment of early breast cancer: What are the non-clinical outcomes associated with disease progression?](#) - summary report of the cross-analysis of data gathered through the three phases;
- [A review of the research landscape for treatment of early breast cancer](#) – this first phase was a mapping review on the published literature of the impacts of treatment of early breast cancer;
- [Findings from a systematic review to explore the patient and societal impacts of disease progression in women who were treated for early breast cancer](#) – this second phase was a systematic review on non-clinical outcomes of recurrence after treatment of early breast cancer;
- [Factors affecting access to treatment of early breast cancer: Case studies from Brazil, Canada, Italy, Spain and UK](#) – this third phase was a qualitative study assessing the factors affecting access and delivery of treatment for early breast cancer.

### **Waiting times for elective and cancer treatment**

The Public Accounts Committee has published [NHS waiting times for elective and cancer treatment](#). The report finds the percentage of patients treated within waiting times standards continues to get worse for both elective (non-urgent care) and cancer treatment. It also finds NHS organisations are not being sufficiently held to account for ensuring patients' rights to treatment within maximum waiting times for elective care and that national organisations lack curiosity regarding the impact of longer waits on patient outcomes and patient harm.

## **Health Inequalities:**

### **Environmental health inequalities in Europe**

WHO Europe has published [Environmental health inequalities in Europe: second assessment report](#). The report documents the environmental health inequalities within countries through 19 inequality indicators on urban, housing and working conditions, basic services and injuries. Inequalities in risks and outcomes occur in all countries in the WHO European Region, and the latest evidence confirms that socially disadvantaged population subgroups are those most affected by environmental hazards, causing avoidable health effects and contributing to health inequalities.

### **Health equity policy tool**

WHO Europe has published [Health Equity Policy Tool: a framework to track policies for increasing health equity in the WHO European Region](#). This framework consists of strategic policies and practical tools to help European governments accelerate progress towards ensuring that everyone has the ability to lead a healthy life and to prosper within as little as five years.

### **Preventable deaths and deprivation**

The Health Foundation has published a chart illustrating [preventable deaths and deprivation](#). The chart shows the risk of preventable death is at least three times higher for people living in the most deprived local areas compared to those living in the least deprived.



### **Infection Control and Immunisation:**

#### **Antimicrobial resistance**

The World Health Organisation has launched a global campaign [urging governments to adopt a tool to reduce the spread of antimicrobial resistance, adverse events and costs](#). The AWaRe tool specifies which antibiotics to use for the most common and serious infections, which ones should be available at all times in the healthcare system, and those that must be used sparingly or preserved and used only as a last resort.

#### **Cost effectiveness methodology for vaccination programmes**

The Department of Health and Social Care has published [Cost-effectiveness methodology for vaccination programmes and procurements: government response](#). This document provides a summary of the responses to a consultation on whether the method for appraising the cost-effectiveness of vaccination programmes should change. ### **Long-term Conditions:**

#### **Musculoskeletal health**

Public Health England has published [Musculoskeletal health: 5 year strategic framework for prevention across the lifecourse](#). This publication is a whole system strategic framework for prevention of musculoskeletal conditions across the life-course. The purpose of this document is to provide stakeholders and system collaborators with a clear statement of PHE, NHS England and Versus Arthritis' commitments to promote MSK health and to prevent MSK conditions. Each collaborating organisation has identified what they will be contributing and in some cases leading on.

#### **National Diabetes Audit**

The Healthcare Quality Improvement Partnership and NHS England have published [National Diabetes Audit: Core Report 1 – Care Processes and Treatment Targets](#). This report examines the findings from the 2017-18 audit. It contains the full key findings, recommendations and new analysis relating to cardiovascular disease (CVD) risk, including new treatment targets showing statin prescriptions for CVD risk reduction.



### **Mental Health:**

#### **Antidepressants and Depression**

The Royal College of Psychiatrists has published a [Position statement on antidepressants and depression](#). The statement calls on NICE to update its antidepressant withdrawal advice to reflect the wide range of experiences patients have. It suggests greater focus is needed on how to assist patients who have problems when withdrawing from antidepressants and more research to quantify how many people have problems when stopping antidepressants.

#### **Improving outcomes for people with mental ill-health and learning disabilities in the criminal justice system**

The Centre for Mental Health has published, [In 10 years' time: improving outcomes for people with mental ill-health, learning disability, developmental disorders or neuro-diverse conditions in the criminal justice system](#). This document marks 10 years since the launch of the Bradley Report on improving outcomes for people with mental ill health and learning disabilities in the criminal justice system. It sets out the key progress that has been made and what is now needed to ensure there is another decade of difference.

## Loneliness

Nesta has published [Finding connection in a disconnected age – stories of community in a time of change](#). This document contains twelve stories that paint a rich and varied picture of the many faces of loneliness and what it means to feel disconnected from those around us.

## Mental health restrictive practice metric definitions

NHS England has published [Specialised Service Quality Dashboards – Mental Health Restrictive Practice metric definitions for 2019/20](#). These Specialised Services Quality Dashboards (SSQD) are designed to provide assurance on the quality of care by collecting information about outcomes from healthcare providers. These thirteen SSQDs relate to mental health restrictive practice.

## Mental Health Watch

The Royal College of Psychiatrists has launched a new website [Mental Health Watch](#). The site is intended to show how well the mental health system in England is performing. It uses 25 key indicators to measure the health of mental health on the following themes: Access, Care, Finance, Leadership, Quality and Workforce. Many of the indicators can be tracked at CCG, STP level or nationally.

## Police-related mental health triage

The Centre for Reviews and Dissemination has published [Police-related triage interventions for mental health-related incidents: a rapid evidence synthesis](#). This report examines evidence on triage interventions when the police receive emergency calls involving people with perceived mental ill-health where no crime has been committed. The research found most interventions involved police officers working in partnership with mental health professionals, and were generally valued by staff and showed some positive effects on procedures and resources. However, results were not entirely consistent and not all important outcomes were measured.

## Workplace bullying in charities

The Centre for Mental Health has published [Workplace bullying in charities and the implications for leadership](#). This document shines a light on the experiences of people who have been bullied in a charity workplace. It highlights the emotional harm it causes, making six recommendations to create safer systems, processes and cultures.

## Stroke and CVD:

### Sentinel Stroke National Audit Programme

The Healthcare Quality Improvement Partnership has published [Sentinel Stroke National Audit Programme: annual report 2019](#). This annual report examines the findings of data collected during five years from April 2013 – March 2018. It aims to provide a picture of the characteristics of people who have a stroke and the care that is provided to them in hospital and following discharge. It also examines changes over time, highlighting those aspects of care which are improving, stagnating or deteriorating, and discusses what still needs to be done to improve stroke care for patients.



## Substance Use:

### Alcohol's harm to others

Public Health England has published [The range and magnitude of alcohol's harm to others](#). This document provides an evidence review of the harm caused by alcohol to the people around those who are drinking. It aims to provide a better understanding about the extent of alcohol's effect on individuals, communities, and society as a whole and supports decisions on the implementation of policies and interventions to reduce the harms to others.
